Message from the Chief Executive Officer

Vince's View

Boys and Girls Country (BGC) will always be a safe haven for children from hard places. I have learned over the years that healing cannot take place until a child feels safe in his surroundings. "Felt safety" is a term used to describe the importance of a safe environment for a child from a traumatic background. We do not just tell kids they are in a safe place; we want to make sure they feel safe in their new home.

We have a dedicated clinical team that meets the needs of our children. BJ Barksdale is our Clinical Director and past president of the Texas Counselors Association. She also has specialized training to help children from traumatic backgrounds. Dr. Tan has been working with us for nearly two decades as our psychiatrist, helping meet the psychotropic needs of our kids, and his love and commitment goes far beyond medical care. Christian Penaloza, our campus minister, is a seminary graduate and has also trained as a biblical counselor to help meet the spiritual component of a child's life. Our team will continue to use their training and expertise, but we all know only God can heal our pain and affliction.

Some of our kids have faced a level of poverty that many of us will never experience, yet they acquired resilience through that hardship. Mother Teresa observed, "We think sometimes that poverty is only being hungry, naked and homeless. The poverty of being unwanted, unloved and uncared for is the greatest poverty." The good news is that God will use our hands and hugs to help our children find healing and restoration. The writer of the book of Psalms declares, "He heals the brokenhearted and binds up their wounds" (Psalm 147:3). Healing can take place instantly or it can be a process. Sometimes our impatience does not allow us to trust God's process even though He is sovereign and in control of our lives. But we are encouraged that He will not allow pain to come into our lives unless it will produce a deeper sanctification and a closer walk with Him.

His ways are not our ways, and His timeline for healing is always orchestrated to perfection.

When new children arrive at BGC, it is amazing to witness their mixed reactions during their first week. Some of them feel comfortable almost immediately and others need a little more space. However, the one thing that is consistent is that it will take time to trust us and time to adjust to their new home and new friends. Regretfully, many family members and adults in their lives have broken their trust. It is our duty and honor to guide them towards building that foundation all over again.

On behalf of the children at Boys and Girls Country, I want to express my deepest gratitude. Your ongoing love and support continue to help us advance our mission. We are grateful beyond words, and we really cannot do it without you!

Student Spotlight Healing In a Christian Community

For many years our children have been given the opportunity to participate in a unique retreat called Vida Nueva. Vida Nueva (VN) is a threeday Christian retreat weekend and movement for youth, encouraging teenagers to commit their lives to Jesus Christ and to live as Christian leaders in their home, church and school. The young adults spend the weekend growing in a community, sharing their testimonies, strengthening social skills and making friendships that will last a lifetime.

The majority of children who live at Boys and Girls Country are 13-18 years old, and many of them choose to participate in a VN retreat. The weekend includes a series of talks given by clergy, youth and adults, all following the basic themes of Christianity in its day-to-day application, and are followed by table discussions. The format is designed to help teens break down the barriers of fear and anxiety around peers, help them see their value through Christ and discover their potential to serve others.

BGC kids who have participated many of whom have experienced trauma - say it changed their lives. The transformation is not easy, however, because it requires trust, vulnerability and lots of prayers. Given that most of our kids come from unstable environments, they hesitate to open up to others, especially their peers. Overcoming that first step proves to be a crucial moment for many of them.

Thankfully, their spiritual growth does not stop at the retreat. VN members and leaders hold weekly, in-depth bible studies for our children. Some of our kids also serve on VN committees, allowing them to grow as leaders, guide newcomers, reconnect with friends and contribute to the growth of their Christian community.

For Marvin, his first VN retreat was life-changing. He was inspired to be baptized and commit his life to Christ, and it helped him grow from a shy and disconnected teenager into a campus leader who participates in 4-H, the Leadership Council and Teen Court. Opening up about his walk with God, he says the hardship of having a broken family helped him cultivate deep relationships with others, and he realized he had a passion for serving people. His passion for serving was recognized, and this year Marvin serves on the committee to plan the weekend retreat.

"I loved spending time with my peers there. At first, I did not understand how opening up to others could be beneficial. Then I understood that it gives me an opportunity to connect with others on the deeper level. It helped me connect with my cottage brothers at BGC and encourage them to participate in VN. I am forever grateful for this opportunity that helped me discover my passion for helping others," shared Marvin.

Striving toward God is something all the children at Boys and Girls Country are encouraged to do. It helps them understand that God has given them the ability, and responsibility, to change the lives of people around them at school and in the community.

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Taking Advantage of Being Independent

Summer was a big time of transition for the 13 seniors who graduated in May. They were settling into the Transitional Living Program and acquiring new skills to become independent. They registered for classes, they worked, and they saved up for their first vehicles. Our young adults were also able to have fun going together on a senior trip to San Antonio, floating the river and soaking in the sun. In all situations, our students are relieved to have the support of their mentors and fellow College & Career students. Occasionally they even go back and have dinner with their cottage.

For David, becoming more independent was a familiar feeling. David was born in the United States but spent most of his life in Mexico, where he had to rely on himself to meet his own basic needs and those of his siblings. He recognized that it was a dangerous place to live with few opportunities for a better future. He grew up in the strife between the locals and the immigrants and the economic turmoil it caused. After living with his relatives on and off, he ended up back in the U.S. three years ago.

When he arrived at Boys and Girls Country, he could not believe he would be able to live in a safe family environment. He was excited to take advantage of the opportunities available to him to build a better future. At the same time, he had a hard time adjusting to the structured environment at BGC.

David faced many challenges when he arrived here. Adaptation to a new world and culture has been extremely difficult for him. He missed the culture of the Mexican community, the food he grew up eating and the friends who watched his back. His English was very limited, and school became a nightmare for David. When David completed his educational assessment, it revealed that he has dyslexia.

Dyslexia was the primary reason for his educational setbacks. He always had trouble understanding and learning things at school but never knew what the problem was. After the diagnosis, David was able to overcome that pain and find a path to successful learning. Thanks to accommodations requested at school along with tutoring in our education lab and counseling services to cope, David was able to get his grades up. Most importantly, he realized that dyslexia did not make him less; it was just a different way of learning. He says that his brain is wired differently, and now he sees it as a blessing.

Today education is something David pursues with passion. He loves math and is studying engineering at Prairie View A&M University. His schedule is busy with a part-time job while pursuing school full-time. He loves working close to BGC's main campus so he can visit his cottage and younger brother. He dreams of owning his own house and a business to be able to bring his family together in a stable environment.

"Our family struggled for so long, and there was always a sense of despair. That's why I want to have my own place where we can reunite. Family means everything to me. BGC taught me that it does not matter where you are coming from, you are accepted here. That's why BGC is my family too," shared David.

Through the years they have taught the kids the benefits of cycling and keys to personal and spiritual growth. Richard took it upon himself to provide as many opportunities as possible to take BGC's young cyclists to various states and competitions.

"They look at Richard as another father figure," shared Jim. "He is still involved in their lives even after they leave the program. He will do anything to support them," added Jim.

Richard has become a successful leader at UPS in his 34 year tenure. He manages 100s of employees daily and builds close relationships with them. "We all have a story, and this is our chance to help others," shared Richard. One of his employees is Joe, a driver with UPS, whose mom struggled when he was a kid. She relied on the resources in the community to help their family stay together, and now he is giving back by supporting the kids at BGC.

Richard's passion for supporting our kids is contagious because he knows firsthand that BGC helps kids break the cycle of poverty, pain and despair.
